 - ◆ Robert reported that they are re-visiting Casselton about starting a new Lions Club. The motion for the Cabinet to help fund a new club from last year will probably be used this year. When a date has been chosen, he would like other Lions Clubs to attend also. He will keep us informed as to date
 - ◆ E-mail of State Paper. PDG AI reported there seems to be some problem with e-mailing the state paper to Lion members from Grand Forks who signed up for this. So far, no one on AI's list that he gave to Stu has received an e-mail version of the paper. DG Duane reported that he was e-mailed the ND Lion and he was supposed to e-mail it to all the ND Lions in his District. Even if it was e-mailed to members, PDG AI reported our expenses re: the ND Lion magazine would not change anyway. This will be discussed at the Foundation meeting in Bismarck.

**Extension Workshop Application and Planning Form
District or Multiple District Extension Workshop**

This application is designed to help districts and/or multiple districts apply for and plan an extension workshop. By completing the form, the new club organizers have taken solid steps to the formation of a new club.

Training Objective: The Extension Workshop is designed to provide extension-minded Lions an opportunity to learn key strategies to successfully charter Lions clubs and participate first-hand in new club formation.

Training Outline: The workshop was designed to cover three areas of extension over three-day period. Day One: Recruiting tot New Club Formation

- The day begins with classroom discussion and review of effective canvassing strategies.
- Morning activities include role-playing recruiting techniques followed by practice in the field recruiting potential new club members.
- Key community leaders are contacted to further build the prospect list.
- In the evening, the team meets to discuss successes and challenges faced during the field experience and begin to follow-up leads to ensure a high turnout to the first meeting.

Day Two: Continued Recruiting and Review of First and Second Meeting Format

- While canvassing participants continue to work in the field, the Guiding Lion, and other Lions appointed to host the first and second meeting, review and discuss effective meeting formats.
- The team meets at the close of the day to discuss successes and challenges and to continue follow-up activities.

Day Three: Certified Guiding Lion Training

- Canvassing activities continue for recruiters
- The appointed Guiding Lions undergo training and certification
- In the afternoon, leads are gathered and the Lions who are designated to continue to build the club review the status of each lead and steps to continue to build the club.

Responsibilities of the Host

- Identify two or three communities near the training location where in-field training can take place (example canvassing) and where a new club could potentially be formed.

- Provide complete Site Development Information (section 3 of this application)
- Promote the workshop to extension-minded Lions and the MERL team so that 12 or more Lions participate.
- Secure meeting space for three days of training. (Keep costs down by using a Lions facility or another inexpensive meeting place!)
- Arrange transportation between the training location and the potential new club location for participants.
- Provide transportation for the consultant to and from the airport if needed.
- Report the Organizers, Guiding Lions and Sponsoring clubs as appointed by the District Governor.
- Assist in securing audio-visual equipment for the training sessions
- Encourage participants to dress in business attire
- If possible, print an attractive flyer with the date, location and time of the new club's first meeting so the information can be given to prospective members.

Responsibilities of Lions Clubs International

- Provide a trained New Club Development Consultant to conduct training
- Cover transportation, hotel accommodations and meals for New Club Development Consultant
- Provide training materials for each participant
- Provide training materials for extension chairpersons and others who would like to conduct the training.

GOAL/PURPOSE #2

To stop the declines of membership in 5NE and at the same time extend some new clubs in the district. 5NE has had a decline in membership for the past 5 years and has not added a new club during that same period of time. (The district has lost 1 club during that period of time.)

The MERLOW team will work very hard to add new members to clubs of 5NE. (A contest is planned for the 2008-2009 year to award the clubs that have the greatest % of increase from July 1, 2008 to June 30, 2009.)

We will develop a uniform Orientation Program to be used by all clubs of 5NE This program will be encouraged to be used by all clubs and especially when new members are installed.

We will also develop a plan to aid the clubs of 5NE to retain current members.

We will attempt to recruit women and younger members into the clubs of SNE. A special attempt will be made to develop more Lees Clubs for 5NE.

We will use the Extension Plan that is developed by LCI in an attempt to extend new clubs into 5NE. We will have two (2) LCI Extension workshops in the District during the 2008-2009 year

Each year about 300 student-guide dog teams graduate. Having a guide dog creates a whole new world of possibilities and independence for the blind graduates. I have asked that each club participate in donating to Leader Dog again this year. DG Duane will bring the quarter folders to his visitations and I have sent letters of request out as well. DG Duane recently attended Leader Dog Tour and I am looking forward to going in September. Leader Dog has new innovative programs that help visually impaired folks to navigate using a GPS called a Trekker. Please help our district achieve its' 100% participation goal.

Great Plains Assistance Dog Foundation is doing great. As of the month of August, we are on our 5th placement and have 3 more planned for this year. The current dog/student placements have worked out exceptionally well. We have several puppies in training and have had some additional income from boarded dogs. The staff is also keeping busy with tours and demos to schools and clubs. There will be a volunteer day coming up this fall to complete the fencing and kennels.
